Sexual Assault Prevention Curriculum

R.E.S.P.E.C.T., available for purchase, is a middle school violence prevention curriculum that addresses the issues of healthy relationships, dating violence, child sexual assault, sexual harassment and sexual assault.

Sexual Violence in West Virginia

Based on data from the National Women's Study and the National Violence Against Women Survey, one in every nine adult women in West Virginia will be a victim of forcible rape in her lifetime.

Who is the victim? According to 2007 WV crime data reported to law enforcement, 86% of the victims were female and 65% were under the age of 18.

Who is the offender? 95% of the offenders were male and nearly 2/3 were not related to the victim.

Where does it happen? Most sexual assaults occur in the home of the victim or the offender.

Rape is a crime of power and control. No matter where it happens or by whom, it is never the victim's fault.

Stalking and Harassment

- repeatedly (two or more times) following a person, knowing that the behavior causes the person followed to reasonably fear for his or her safety or suffer significant emotional distress; OR
- repeatedly harassing (willful conduct causing emotional distress) or repeatedly making credible threats against another.

National stalking and harassment statistics released in 2009 indicate that women are 3 times more likely than males to be stalked. The stalker is usually someone known to the victim (45%) or a current/former spouse/partner (30%). Males and females were equally likely to experience harassment.

West Virginia Law §61-2-9(a)(b) includes penalties and definitions for stalking and harassment. Behaviors that are identified in this section include:

Programs and Projects

Awareness Month Activities

Stalking Awareness Month (January) and Sexual Assault Awareness Month (April) provide additional opportunities to distribute informational materials and conduct special educational activities. FRIS provides printed materials for distribution and assists organizations in planning special awareness events.

Prevention Programs

FRIS supports a Prevention Education Specialist at each rape crisis center to coordinate community efforts on preventing sexual assault and stalking through educational programs, resources and activities.

Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANEs)

SANEs are specially trained registered nurses who conduct forensic medical exams for sexual assault victims. FRIS provides technical assistance to hospitals, colleges, and licensed medical facilities interested in developing SANE programs.

Sexual Assault and Persons with Disabilities

FRIS is coordinating a statewide initiative to examine policies and strengthen prevention and intervention programs for this vulnerable population.

Sexual Assault Response Teams (SARTs)

FRIS assists communities in developing multidisciplinary SARTs and coordinates free SART trainings.

Trainings

FRIS offers regional and statewide trainings on the issues of stalking and sexual violence. The annual spring symposium attracts hundreds of professionals from around the state.

West Virginia's college campuses and rape crisis centers participate with FRIS to share resources, policies and prevention programming ideas.
