

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

James Markey is a 28-year veteran of law enforcement and is currently a Sergeant with the City of Phoenix Police Department. An expert in the investigation of sexual crimes, he has participated in 6,000 felony sexual assault investigations. In his 11 years of conducting trainings, he has developed curricula for the National Institute of Justice, the University of Tennessee Law Enforcement Innovation Center, The Harvard John F. Kennedy School of Government, and the Dartmouth College Interactive Media Lab. He has written articles on investigating cold cases and co-authored a manual titled *Patrol Response to Drug Facilitated Sexual Assault*. Sergeant Markey holds a Master's degree from Northern Arizona University and a Bachelor of Science degree from Arizona State University.

Michelle M. Garcia has worked to end violence against women for more than 20 years. Since 2006, she has served as the director of the Stalking Resource Center (SRC) of the National Center for Victims of Crime. She coordinates the SRC's training and technical assistance, material and resource development and media relations. Ms. Garcia currently serves on the Editorial Board of the Sexual Assault Report, the American Bar Association Commission on Domestic and Sexual Violence, and the Advisory Board of the School and College Organization for Prevention Educators. She received her Master degree in Public Policy from the University of Chicago.

Josh Brunty is an Assistant Professor of Digital Forensics at Marshall University. A former digital forensics examiner with the WVSP Digital Forensics Laboratory, Mr. Brunty has extensive experience in investigations involving digital and multimedia evidence. He is co-author of the newly released forensic studies for criminal justice text, *Social Media Investigation for Law Enforcement*. Mr. Brunty is a member of the Mid-Atlantic Association of the High Technology Crime Investigation Association, the Digital-Multimedia Sciences section of the American Academy of Forensic Sciences, the WV Cyber Crimes Task Force, and the WV Chapter of FBI INFRAGARD.

Tessa Cooper has been employed with the FBI as a Victim Specialist (VS) in the Charleston Division since October, 2002. VS Cooper serves as an elected member of the FBI Victim Specialist Working Group designed to assist the Office for Victim Assistance to enhance victims' rights and services through collaborative efforts. Ms. Cooper has served as the Victim Services Coordinator for the Lincoln County Probation Office, a medical Social Worker/Forensic Interviewer for CAMC Women's and Children and a CPS worker for WVDHHR. She received a Master degree in Social Work from WVU.

Bonnie Fields, RN, BSN, SANE-A serves as the WV SANE Coordinator for WV FRIS. Ms. Fields has worked with community leaders, hospital administrations, and SANE/SART teams to establish programs that assist sexual assault victims. At WVU Student Health Services she has worked to pilot and

establish the only active SANE program in a university student health facility in WV. She graduated from Penn State University with an Associate and Bachelor degree in Nursing.

Angela Kay Gill holds a Bachelor and Master degrees in Biological Sciences from Marshall University. At the WVSP Forensic Laboratory, Ms. Gill is a Forensic Analyst in the Biochemistry Section. She conducts analysis pertaining to hair, blood and other biological materials that are submitted to the Laboratory. Ms. Gill also conducts training for new analysts and technicians at the Laboratory.

Christopher Vance, is a Digital Forensics Specialist currently working for WVSP Digital Forensics Unit. Mr. Vance has been assigned to the unit for over five years where he has specialized in Mobile Device Forensics and other digital evidence. Mr. Vance has published several papers on the topic, as well as providing trainings for a multitude of conferences and working groups.
